## Annual Report

THE past year has seen no marked change in the fortunes of the Society, but Branches continue in their activities with success as can be seen from the detailed reports in this Bulletin. Membership has also increased slightly.

On a domestic matter, the Society is experiencing some difficulty in the economic running and use of its Headquarters premises. This is receiving the careful attention of the General Purposes Committee under their Convener Mr. J. B. C. Brown, J.P., M.A., LL.B., Chairman of the Executive Council, and in due course a satisfactory solution can be expected.

In the early autumn, Miss Milligan again undertook a strenuous tour of North America. These tours are arranged to enable candidates to take certificate examinations, but such is Miss Milligan's enthusiasm that they become major events on the calendar of all Scottish Country Dancers even although she may be in an area for only a very short time. The Society is indeed fortunate that Miss Milligan is available to undertake these lengthy tours which necessitate her absence from home for long periods.

During the late spring, two other members were invited by Branches in U.S.A. to conduct day and week-end schools and the reports indicate that these occasions were full of interest and entertainment for those attending.

There was a demand for teams to visit continental Dance Festivals and during the year Ayr, Edinburgh, Glasgow, London and St. Andrews Branches represented the Society at some of these events.

A comprehensive Festival of Movement and Dance was arranged in March by the Scottish Council of Physical Recreation at the Meadowbank Stadium and Scottish Branches were invited to send teams to demonstrate Scottish Country Dances. The event, which the organisers had arranged with some trepidation, proved to be an outstanding success and Society dancers had the privilege of providing a spectacular Grand Finale at each of the three performances. As a direct result of this, the Society was invited to participate in the Scottish Education Department's celebration of the Centenary of Education (Scotland) Act 1872, when selected items from the Movement and Dance Festival were repeated.

Another interesting engagement for Scottish and North of England teams was the invitation from the Scottish Pipe Band Association to give a demonstration at the World Pipe Band Championship which took place at Hawick in June.

All these demonstrations have been excellent advertisements and it is to be hoped will attract members to the Society.

**Annual General Meeting and Autumn School**—The Music Hall, Aberdeen, accommodated the members attending the 42nd Annual General Meeting of the Society on Saturday, 30th October, 1971. Prior to the meeting, the Lord Provost and Councillors of the City of Aberdeen entertained the office-bearers and Executive Council members to lunch in the Beach Ballroom.

On the Friday evening, the Beach Ballroom was the setting for the Ball, while Saturday evening's dance took place in the Music Hall as did the classes.

All the events were very well attended and much enjoyed by the participants.

Aberdeen Branch officials and members are to be congratulated on the excellence of the arrangements made for the conduct of the events of the week-end and thanked for the warm welcome extended to members who were present for the occasion.

**Membership.** The detail available shows a small increase in Annual membership and continuing interest in Life membership of the Society. The totals for the year ended 30th June, 1972, are 10,880 and 4,720 respectively. The comparative figures for last year are 10,816 and 4,373.

Applications for affiliation received during the year numbered 14, giving a total of 280 groups now affiliated.

subscriptions have been paid for the year 1st July 1972 to 30th June 1973. The new publication—Book 26—and the Annual Bulletin will be available to members in the autumn.

**Examinations.** A much larger number of candidates applied to take the Society examinations and a very high proportion were successful. During the year, 201 of the 237 entrants for the Preliminary Test passed and 139 candidates gained the Teacher's Certificate. As is customary, the examination year commenced at St. Andrews, while during the year examiners visited Branches at Aberdeen, N.W. Ayrshire, Boston, Delaware Valley, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Hamilton (Ontario), Inverness, London, Los Angeles, New York, New Zealand (Mrs. Lesslie examining), Ottawa, San Francisco, St. Catharines (Ontario), Toronto, Vancouver. In addition, groups of candidates at Calgary, Eastbourne and Fredericton were visited. The totals include candidates presented by Colleges of Education in Aberdeen, Edinburgh (Craiglockhart and Moray House), Falkirk (Callendar Park) and Glasgow (Jordanhill).

**Summer School.** Over 650 members, both home and overseas, have had the experience and pleasure of attending the annual Summer School at St. Andrews where Miss Milligan and her staff conducted classes for dancers of all standards. During the course of the School, demonstration teams gave displays at Pitlochry and Aberfeldy.

## 50th Anniversary

THE year 1973 will be indeed a wonderful year for The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society. Fifty years have passed since two ladies sat in a small office in Glasgow wondering if they formed a Society to save Scottish dances from being forgotten, would anyone be interested. Now there are over 100 Branches of the Society—hundreds of affiliations from all over the world and adherents like the sands of the sea.

Also 1973 must be celebrated in such a way that it becomes a never-to-be-forgotten year, treasured for ever in the archives of the Society. It is the intention of the Executive Council to publish a brochure with an account of all the various happenings at the celebrations which all members will receive as the book of the year.

Our Royal Patron, Her Majesty the Queen, has shown interest in this anniversary and it is hoped that we might be able to arrange some function she might grace with her presence.

Naturally, the main celebrations will take place in Glasgow—the birthplace of The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society—at the Annual General Meeting on the first week-end of November and Miss M. L. Ross, Chairman of the Glasgow Branch and her indefatigable Vice-Chairman and committee are toiling to make the most attractive preparations. The highlight will be the luncheon on the Saturday which on this occasion will not be for Executive Council members only but for as many—especially for those from distances—as we can accommodate. Already a dining-room with seating for 700 has been booked. A civic reception and a formal Ball for the Friday evening and halls to accommodate everyone for an informal Ball on the Saturday evening have been arranged.

It is needless to stress the necessity of knowing as soon as possible those who intend to be present and, of course, only members of at least one or two years standing may apply. The form included in this Bulletin should be filled up at once and returned to Glasgow. All applicants will be sent details of the arrangements and costs nearer the time. It is hoped that through the 'Mile of Pennies' (now in the second mile) the cost will be kept reasonable.

At the 1973 Summer School at St. Andrews, many pleasant happenings are being arranged for those unable to be at the Annual General Meeting.

It is hoped that the Branches will themselves mark the anniversary in some way to remind their members of the debt they owe for the happiness and friendship which the 50 years of work by the Society has given them. In this connection, Glasgow Branch intends to have a function especially designed to bring back amongst them many former members and especially founder members who have for various reasons lost touch with the Branch. This might be done by many of the older Branches.

For those who can come to the Annual General Meeting, a very warm welcome is assured.

## Minutes of Annual General Meeting,

30th October 1971

**MINUTES of the Forty-second Annual General Meeting** held on Saturday, 30th October, 1971, at 2.30 p.m. in the Music Hall, Aberdeen.

**Present**—Miss J. C. Milligan, Vice-President, Mr. J. B. C. Brown, Chairman of Executive Council, and an approximate attendance of 387 of whom 97 were delegates.

At the commencement of the meeting, a message from the Patron of the Society, Her Majesty The Queen, thanking the Society for its loyal greetings, was read by Miss Milligan, Vice-President.

The Vice-President addressed the meeting and spoke of the increasing international interest in the Society. This had shown on her recent tour of North America, where Branches were flourishing, but it was sad to note the decline in membership, particularly in Scotland. Miss Milligan urged Branches to advertise their activities to attract more members.

Miss Milligan then thanked the City of Aberdeen, represented by Bailie Rose and Councillors, for its generous hospitality at the luncheon for officials, Branch representatives and guests, including Lieutenant-Colonel Colin Mitchell, an Hon. Vice-President.

The Vice-President concluded by reminding members of her fund-raising campaign in connection with the celebrations which were to take place in Glasgow in 1973 for the 50th anniversary of the Society.

At this point, the Vice-President invited the Chairman of the Executive Council, Mr. J. B. C. Brown, to conduct the business of the meeting.

The Chairman thanked Miss Milligan for the work she did for the Society, both at home and abroad and for her words of inspiration.

The Chairman welcomed delegates from 51 Branches and thanked the office-bearers in Branches, the members of the Executive Council and sub-committees for their work for the Society.

It was with regret that he announced the death in June 1971 of Major-General Lord Thurlow, C.B., C.B.E., D.S.O., an Hon. Vice-President and a former President of the Society.

A letter had been received from Mr. J. L. Lochhead, Immediate Past Chairman of the Society, sending best wishes for the success of the meeting. Mr. Lochhead had taken ill earlier in the year but was now making satisfactory progress.

**Minutes**—The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting, held on 31st October, 1970, having been circulated in the Bulletin, were approved and signed.

**Confirmation of the appointment of President**—It was with pleasure that the Chairman proposed the confirmation of the appointment of the Rt. Hon. Lord Macdonald as President of the Society. This was seconded by the Vice-President, Miss Milligan, and approved unanimously.

The Chairman had had a meeting with Lord Macdonald who seemed most interested in the affairs of the Society. Lord Macdonald had expressed regret at his inability to be present at the Annual General Meeting.

**Confirmation of the appointment of Hon. Vice-Presidents**—Mr. Brown, Chairman, proposed the confirmation of the appointment of the Countess of Galloway, the Duke of Hamilton, K.T., the Duke of Atholl, Miss Gray-Buchanan, Colonel George I. Malcolm of Poltalloch, Sir Iain Moncreiffe of that Ilk, D.L., Ph.D., Lieutenant-Colonel Colin C. Mitchell, M.P., Sir Herbert Brechin, C.B.E., J.P., D.LITT., F.R.I.C.S., F.R.S.E. Miss Adams seconded the confirmation of these appointments and this was approved unanimously.

**Election of Office-bearers and Six Elected Members**—

**Chairman:** Mr. J. B. C. Brown was elected to this office being the sole nominee.

**Vice-Chairman:** Miss F. H. Adams was elected to this office being the sole nominee.



Mr. Brown thanked members on behalf of Miss Adams and himself for their confidence and assured them of their intention to continue to further the aims of the Society.

**Six Elected Members:** The following were elected by vote—Mr. A. S. Aitkenhead, Mrs. M. Corson, Mr. J. Drewry, Mrs. N. Dunn, Dr. I. M. Hall and Miss M. L. Ross.

**Adoption of Annual Report**—In proposing the adoption of the Annual Report, Miss L. C. Martin (Aberdeen) thanked the Secretary for the interesting and informative account of the Society's work during the year. This was seconded by Miss Grieve (Roxburgh and Selkirk District) and approved by the meeting.

The Chairman added his appreciation of the work of the Secretary in connection with the preparation of the Bulletin.

**Annual Accounts and Balance Sheet**—The Chairman, as Convener of the Finance Committee, presented the Annual Accounts and Balance Sheet. The Revenue Account showed a somewhat sombre picture. Despite a record Summer School, high investment income, good book sales and royalties, the Society felt the effects of inflation and had a surplus of only £140. It had not been possible to make any allocation to the Staff Fund as was normal. Increases were shown in salaries £471, Committee meeting expenses £129, postage and telephone £70, office accommodation £159, repairs and maintenance £298, costing of printing Bulletin £93. These together amounted to £1,220. With subscriptions down by £425, this showed an overall decrease of £1,645.

The Executive Council were aware of the cost of maintenance at Headquarters and as a first step the Society had dispensed with the services of the resident Caretaker. This it was hoped would show a saving of £500 per annum. A sub-committee would be meeting to consider the future of the basement premises vacated by the Caretaker.

The Chairman thanked the Finance Committee and the Treasurer for their work and then invited Miss Vaughan to comment on certain aspects of the Society finances.

Miss Vaughan brought to the notice of members that the estimates for the forthcoming year for the first time showed a deficit. Consideration would have to be given to the question of subscriptions, particularly with regard to Life Members who now numbered over 4,000. The present Life Membership subscription was based on a 15 year period, after which Life Members became a liability on the Society.

Commenting on the successful sales of books and records, the Treasurer reminded the meeting that there were reserves set aside for publications, films and records and that with care and thought further records and publications might be produced to boost the income.

The Treasurer concluded by hoping that the estimated deficit would prove to have been only a paper entry when the next accounts were presented.

Mr. Corbett (Newcastle-upon-Tyne District) thanked the Treasurer, Miss Vaughan, for her work; she was always ready to give advice to the Finance Committee and was available to Branches to assist with any difficulties they might have. He then said he had much pleasure in proposing the adoption of the Accounts and Balance Sheet.

Mr. King (Edinburgh) said the Balance Sheet, Revenue and other accounts reflected a great deal of work from the Chairman and Finance Committee and he had pleasure in seconding the adoption of the Annual Accounts and Balance Sheet. This was approved by the meeting.

**Confirmation of the appointment of the Auditor**—The confirmation of the appointment of the Auditor, Mr. Arthur Walker, C.A., was proposed by Mr. Meredith (East Lothian), seconded by Mr. Green (Birmingham) and approved by the meeting.

The Chairman said the appreciation of the Society would be conveyed to the Auditor, Mr. Walker, for his services.

#### Resolution—

##### From the Executive Council

That The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society Constitution and Rules be altered as follows:

In Section VI, Subsection (2) (a)—

"The Executive Council shall hold at least two Ordinary Meetings in each year. At least three weeks' clear notice of a meeting shall be given to each member."

The resolution was proposed by Miss M. L. Ross (Glasgow), seconded by Dr. Hall (Manchester) and unanimously approved by the meeting.

**Annual General Meeting, 1972**—The Chairman confirmed that the Executive Council had accepted with pleasure an invitation from Ayr Branch to hold the Annual General Meeting in Ayr on 28th October, 1972.

**Vote of Thanks**—Mrs. Parker (Ayr) said there were many to thank for the success of the week-end. Firstly, Miss Milligan—who reminded her of what Shakespeare said of Cleopatra—"Age cannot wither her nor custom stale her infinite variety"—had indulged in a little devolution of duty in giving over her position to Mr. Brown who had all the attributes of the ideal Chairman. Mrs. Parker also thanked the Aberdeen Town Council for their generous hospitality. The week-end had been most successful and Mrs. Parker asked the Chairman of the Branch to extend to those responsible the grateful thanks of the members who appreciated the organisation and hospitality which had made the stay a happy one.

## Branch Reports — Home

**Aberdeen Branch** entertained overseas visitors with displays during the summer season. At the residential Easter week-end at Johnston Hall, classes were conducted by Mrs. Keith (Lily Hunter) and Mr. Ireland. Teams were again entered for the Scottish Country Dance Festival. The Branch was host to the Society at the Annual General Meeting in October 1971. The event was most successful and many letters have been received from members of visiting Branches expressing gratitude for the arrangements made.

**Ayr Branch** had another lively year. With the excellent co-operation from class teachers, accompanists and adult and junior class members, the effect of the fuel crisis on classes at the beginning of the year was minimal. The Branch looks forward to acting host to the Annual General Meeting this autumn and to welcoming old friends and making new ones.

**Bath Branch** has had another successful year, marred by one disappointment. For the first time since the Branch was formed, the Annual Ball had to be cancelled because of the emergency arising from the fuel crisis. The Ball had been oversubscribed, with a waiting list of over 30.

Members have visited other Branches and Affiliated Societies and the Branch has welcomed visitors from those bodies.

Demonstrations of Scottish Country Dancing have been given in the shadow of Bath Abbey and the Pump Room on one or two Saturday afternoons during the summer, and these were enjoyed by tourists and Bathonians alike.

The **Bedfordshire Branch** is newly formed and hoped to cater for all the needs of dancers in the centre of the country. Functions throughout the year are already supported by people from a very wide area and it is hoped to increase their interest. A Day Course will be held on 14th October with three classes—Advanced Class by Mr. Bill Hamilton. The day will end with the usual social dancing to music supplied by a group of talented local musicians.

There will be an advanced class in Bedford and if the numbers are sufficient, it may be possible to arrange for interested members to take their Teacher's Certificate. The Branch intends to run the usual social class at Riseley and arrange one or two more evening classes in new areas. New members coming to the area will be extremely welcome.

It has proved to be a highly successful year for **Birmingham Branch** with membership being maintained at over 300. Balls and socials were all well attended and enjoyed, as was the Silver Jubilee Dinner, an event which gave an unusual opportunity for



unlimited time to talk to each other. The week-end and day schools passed all too quickly and happily. The Branch participated in a new event in the city—a Highland Gathering. This was blessed with fine weather until the Social Dancing started at night when the heavens opened. A weekly class and two socials for young people have been run quite successfully. Many demonstrations have been given in and around the area. Thanks are due to many members of the Branch, without whose help the programme could not have been successful.

A very successful year is reported by the **Bristol** Branch. The demonstration team have had an extremely busy but most enjoyable season. The week-end non-residential course, conducted by Mr. Jackie Johnstone from Dumfries, was enjoyed by all who attended.

The Branch held its first Hogmanay Dance this season—a most happy occasion. Everyone present, including the members of other Branches who came along requested that this function be repeated in the future.

**Dumfries** Branch social activities have been greatly enjoyed and teams took part successfully in the Dumfries and Carlisle Festivals. Demonstrations were also given during the year.

**Dumbartonshire West** Branch arranged its now customary balls and social events, including the Charity Dance, this year in aid of Quarriers Homes, Bridge of Weir. This function took place despite the fuel crisis and realised £140 for the charity. Since starting these dances ten years ago, the Branch has now donated over £1,000 to various well-known charities.

The enthusiasm and dancing ability of the younger members is most encouraging. The Junior Dance was attended by over 90 members.

This year sees the 'Coming of Age' of the Branch and this will be marked with celebrations.

**Dundee** Branch had a most enjoyable year with the adult and children's classes well attended, although the latter have shown a slight drop. The demonstration team spent a most enjoyable week-end in Izigem in Belgium from 28th May to 1st June and were accompanied on their trip by two pipers. The team also entered for the mixed and ladies section of the Arbroath and Perth Festivals and were very successful although disappointed at the lack of opposition. Unfortunately the week-end school had to be cancelled because of the fuel crisis in February. Social dances were held in May and June in addition to the Club meetings on a Monday evening, which are always very convivial.

Functions arranged by **Duns and District** Branch, including the Week-end School in May, were most successful. At the Branch Annual General Meeting, Dr. A. Jamieson retired as Chairman, having served for ten years. After thanking Dr. Jamieson for his service over the years, Miss Margaret Rae took the Chair.

A social in December marked the 21st birthday of the **Forres** Branch. The guests included members of the original committee. The Week-end School was held in April with Miss Milligan and Mrs. West teaching.

**Gatehouse** Branch has had another successful session, socially and financially. Membership has risen to 46 and the bank balance creeps up. Our one class (age range 15-70) meets in all weathers and in spite of the fuel crisis. Readers will be interested to know that we have a new 'Dancing Girl' in our class. Mrs. Rae of Castle Douglas has exchanged her music case for ballet shoes and is the instigator of much riotous behaviour in our normally staid class! Our social functions attract dancers from all over Galloway. Demonstrations do not often come our way, but in May members from Dumfries, Castle Douglas, Kirkcudbright and Gatehouse, trained by Mr. Little, danced on the beautiful lawns of Cally Hotel at the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Stewartry of the S.W.R.I.

Two of our new committee members are young ladies who started dancing at a very tender age in the redoubtable Mrs. Parkhill's class. Catch 'em young and keep them!

To mark the Golden Jubilee of the R.S.C.D.S. we are planning for next March a joint Stewartry Ball organised by Gatehouse, Kirkcudbright and Castle Douglas Branches.

**Glasgow** Branch has had a very active year—much thought being given to the Jubilee of the Society. Arrangements are well in hand and it is hoped to see as many as possible at the celebrations—especially founder members.

The classes have been well attended and those taking certificates were very successful. The demonstration team has been very busy, as well as giving many demonstrations to Societies, Conferences and Women's Guilds they have organised two concerts—one in conjunction with Anderston Church and the other for the Highlanders' Institute as part of Clyde Fair International.

A most successful Week-end School was held and the Branch thank Miss Milligan, Miss Wilson, Mr. Aitkenhead and Mrs. Storr (of the Keep Fit Movement) for their interesting classes.

**Herefordshire** Branch has had another busy year with members attending Day Schools at Birmingham, Bristol, Cheltenham, Malvern and Newport, Dances at Birmingham, Bristol, Cardiff, Cheltenham, Malvern and Worcester, and the Summer School at St. Andrews.

Demonstrations were given at Ewyas Harold and twice during the Cider Festival, and there are still some four to be undertaken—at Kington, Lydney and Hereford.

The parties held at Christmas and New Year were successful and enjoyed by all who attended.

The Annual Ball was held on 6th May at St. Mary's School, Lugwardine. The new venue and change of catering were pleasing to many and drew a number of compliments from outsiders. There were mixed feelings about some of the tunes played by the band but nevertheless it had been a very pleasant evening. The piper who played to welcome the guests and during the interval was an added attraction and greatly enjoyed.

The President, Mr. John Lawson, cut the birthday cake at the Supper/Dance at which many former members and friends from the surrounding district were present, to celebrate the 35th birthday of **Kilmarnock** Branch.

Classes at **Leamington Spa** were well attended and the Day School in October was taught by Mr. Bill Hamilton. Three teams entered for the Aston Festival.

**Lockerbie** Branch class was well attended throughout the season. In March at a social evening, a presentation was made to Miss M. Lorimer, a former teacher, in appreciation of her work for the Branch.

**London** Branch report a successful year, with weekly classes, monthly dances, two guest dances, plus the Annual Ball. Two Week-end Schools and a one-day School were organised—the latter was taken by Miss Milligan during her visit to London for the Teacher's Certificate examinations.

A new departure during the year was the running of a Scottish concert of music and dance which was enjoyable and successful.

Members visiting London are welcome at the classes.

**Manchester's** four country dance classes and the Highland class were well attended, as usual, and the annual Scots' Night concert was described by the audience as "being better than ever". The Day Course was successful and arrangements are well in hand for the next one on 30th September. The ceilidhs, social dances and the Annual Ball were very enjoyable occasions and the demand for demonstrations is ever increasing. The summer classes were very popular with all the members and it is now taken for granted that these will be held every year after the regular graded classes have finished. The 13th annual Manchester Scots' Night takes place next year on 11th May. Arrangements are being made to hold an end-of-season dance for the Branch in conjunction with all the Scottish societies in and around Manchester and this new venture is being looked forward to with keen interest. During July, the demonstration teams travelled to America and Canada to dance at a succession of concerts in Oregon and British Columbia.

The season opened appropriately with a luncheon at the University to celebrate **Newcastle's** twenty-one years as a Branch. The guests on that occasion were the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Newcastle and Mr. J. B. C. Brown, Chairman of the Executive Council of the Society, and all the past officers of the Branch, including Miss Scott and Miss Price of the C.C.P.R., who did so much to help form



the Branch. The day's celebrations were rounded off by a very successful dance, also at the University. Timed to coincide with the celebration luncheon, the Branch published "The Newcastle Collection of Country Dance Tunes". This has been very well received and to date nearly 400 copies have been sold. Dances have been well attended and as usual people were clamouring for tickets for the Highland Ball. Alnwick Castle week-end is still very popular and many people travelled to the dances held on the Friday and Saturday evenings.

Demonstrations continue to be in great demand and members have had another busy year. For some weeks teams danced at Lumley Castle and appeared twice on television—once with Jimmy Shand playing and on New Year's Eve the whole of the demonstration class danced.

**Nottingham** Branch classes have continued and four dances were arranged using a local band. Friends from a wide area supported the Annual Dance, for which the Danelaw Band was engaged. As an experiment, two courses from 2-10 p.m. were conducted by Miss Donaldson. These were most successful and will be repeated next year.

A demonstration class was given a trial run of six months by **Perthshire** Branch and during that time undertook a few engagements, but due to lack of male dancers had to be discontinued. The Branch held a successful dance in the City Hall in June attended by some 250 dancers, including visitors from U.S.A. and Germany and Society members from Surrey, Stirling, Dundee, Glasgow and Edinburgh. Mrs. Corson adjudicated at Perthshire Musical Festival in which the two children's classes took part—one gaining first place in their section.

**Richmond** Branch membership has increased slightly and the Annual Dinner-Dance was again well attended. A demonstration team has been formed to meet requests for displays at various local functions.

In **Sheffield** enthusiastic support was always forthcoming at the various functions held. The demonstration group attended many functions throughout the year and the entertainment they gave was matched only by their own enjoyment.

The children's Festival of Scottish Dancing was attended by about 30 teams—it was most gratifying to see so many young people taking part and obviously enjoying themselves.

On the anniversary of the inauguration of the **Southport** Branch, the committee had a meeting. This was followed by a successful 25th Anniversary Ball at which the guests of honour were five of the founder members. To celebrate the event, a cake was cut by the Branch Vice-Presidents.

At the annual Festival of Scottish Dancing, the Branch welcomed four teams from Scotland among the visitors.

Membership figures are stable, finances sound, and all social events and classes have been well supported—the fuel crisis led to a brief cancellation of classes, but extra sessions were arranged in lieu, so all ended happily.

Mrs. Gudger conducted a Week-end School (including a class for teachers only) which was much appreciated.

The demonstration team have given many displays, and were invited to take part in this year's Chichester Festival.

**South Wales** Branch has had another successful year. An excellent Day Course at Hartridge High School, Newport, was conducted by Mrs. Anna Holden, with Mrs. Margaret Rae as pianist. Branch classes have continued to run throughout the year, and instruction evenings have been held from time to time.

The Branch also held several social dances including a very enjoyable Hallowe'en party and arranged a picnic for the benefit of a local Spastics School.

This has been a difficult year for **Stirlingshire** Branch who, like others, had to cancel classes due to the fuel crisis. Reluctantly, the Bridge of Allan class had to be discontinued but members who could attend were welcomed to the Branch Thursday class.

The children's classes were not so well attended during the past winter session but at the Parents' Day in March the spirit and skill of the children was well worth the work put in by the teachers.

The two supper dances held in the Golden Lion Hotel in December and March were well attended when friends from other Branches joined the Stirlingshire members.

After a lapse of three years the Branch were asked to organise a dance during the Stirling Festival. This was a great success, with 196 dancers and 61 spectators.

Once again a class was taken in the autumn by a visiting teacher, this year Miss Vera Seddon from Edinburgh, and proved most enjoyable.

Branch activities in **Stirlingshire East** followed the usual pattern this year. A very enjoyable evening was spent on 17th November in Falkirk Technical College Hall, with Mrs. McLaren as instructress. The December dance held in Grangemouth was a great success socially while the Falkirk Festival Ball in Falkirk Town Hall in March continued to attract dancers from far and near.

Three teams were entered for the Central Counties Musical Festival held in Falkirk in June—ladies, mixed and young folk. All acquitted themselves well. Teams, both ladies and mixed, have been in demand for demonstrations.

The success of the **Teesside** Branch must undoubtedly be the format laid down when it was formed in 1955, with weekly classes and monthly social dances as an outlet for classwork.

During the season a barbecue was organised and a Festival held, at which it was gratifying to note the interest the civic dignitaries took in the work of the Branch. Another annual event is the Dryburgh Week-end when all 'emigrate' across the border, take over the hotel and set about the business of enjoying the event.

Visitors to this area are invited to participate in the activities during their stay.

## Branch Reports — Overseas

**The Hague District** Branch had a very pleasant and successful year. The demonstration team gave several displays to pensioners.

At the fifth Easter Week-end, Mr. Bill Hamilton taught, making it an unforgettable event. Next year this course will be conducted in Stuttgart when the German guests to The Hague will act as hosts.

**Hamilton** Branch has completed another busy year. In August five teams performed at the provincial government's new lakeshore showplace 'Ontario Place'.

Dancers from across Canada and Eastern United States attended a successful week-end in October held at Niagara Falls.

The children also had a busy year with two dances held and 200 young folk attending each. Their festival attracted 41 entries in five sections. Teams from the Branch classes won medals and trophies in both Hamilton and Toronto.

Stan Hamilton and his Band provided the music for the Annual Ball, which was the highlight of the season.

**Johannesburg** Branch has maintained its membership well and activities have continued as usual. Four classes are offered—Beginners, Elementary, Intermediate and Advanced. The competition teams have done well this year. The spring and autumn Week-end Schools were again much enjoyed, with newcomers from a small group in Gabarone, Botswana. A delightful Highland Ball was held at the end of November, which was a change from the usual winter Ball, but made a most enjoyable end-of-season function. The Fifty-First Club, the club which now forms the Johannesburg Branch, has entered on its 21st anniversary year and several celebrations are planned.

The **Los Angeles** Branch had its ups and downs this year.

Miss Milligan's visit in the fall was eagerly anticipated and was an experience not soon forgotten. She regaled the members with anecdotes of her years since the founding of the Society.



A few months after this event, the 'Brandons' (David, founding Chairman of the Los Angeles Branch and Mary, our senior instructor and team director) moved to Hawaii. A job assignment with the University of Hawaii's I.B.M. installation necessitated the move. Their talents, energy and dedication to furthering the R.S.C.D.S. in Southern California will be missed.

Fifteen active dancing groups form **Melbourne and District Branch**. Membership has increased and this trend should continue. During the past year three special classes were held by the Branch and an excellent week-end at Somers where a well-attended dance was held on the Saturday night. Demonstration sets from the various Clubs appear fairly regularly at charitable and local functions and on occasions at Highland Games and Gatherings.

Highlighting the past season at **Montreal Branch** were the visits of Bill Hamilton and Duncan Macleod, teachers from Glasgow. Bill Hamilton's visit in November 1971 took the form of a workshop week-end consisting of two classes on Saturday followed by a social in the evening, and a further class on Sunday afternoon.

Duncan Macleod, on the other hand, had only a short stay in Montreal and his one-night class consisted of basic footwork and technique. The attendance for both visiting teachers was very good as some 80 persons attended both of these events.

The 1971/72 session came to a close with a workshop week-end held in early June at Auberge La Caleche in the Laurentian Mountains where classes were conducted at all levels. The Montreal Branch was fortunate to have as teachers for this week-end Mrs. Margaret Macwaters of Ottawa, Ontario and Miss Jean Yeats and Mr. Bob Blackie of Toronto, Ontario.

**Nairobi Branch** reports a successful year, with four demonstrations and good support for the Annual Ball and Week-end. Entertaining the first party of American Square Dancing tourists to visit Africa proved particularly popular, and the favourable press publicity resulting has helped to increase membership. Too far away to arrange meetings with other Branches, the Nairobi Branch much welcomed this contact with dancers from another continent.

**New Zealand Branch** has had another good year, the highlight being the annual Summer School in Dunedin, the Edinburgh of the South, attended by 250 dancers. During the School there was a Ball at Larnach Castle, with dancers in either period or formal dress. This was a first-ever for the Branch as castles are few and far between in this new country. Quite a few of the Clubs have or will soon celebrate their 21st birthdays, thus showing that Scottish Country Dancing is really fairly young in this country, on an organised basis. The Scots have always danced wherever they have gone, but only in the last twenty years or so have they met up with other groups, throughout the country.

**Toronto Branch** had a busy and enjoyable year and the membership continues to grow. There was a record attendance at the Geneva Park Week-end in September which proved to be a memorable one with Miss Milligan's teaching and encouragement. In honour of her visit, Miss Pat Kincaid composed a dance, "The Thistle and the Trillium", which was demonstrated and then danced by everyone at the Saturday night Ball.

The classes given by Mr. Duncan Macleod and Mr. Bill Hamilton were well attended and very much enjoyed. About two hundred people attended each of the six monthly classes and the Tartan Ball was a sell-out; there were so many disappointed dancers, that the Branch has had to find a larger ballroom for next year. The winter ended with a very successful Children's Festival.

SOME years ago I stood on the rocks at Portpatrick, on the west coast of Scotland, in the late evening. Under the influence of the distant and barely discernible moon, the tide race was pushing the breakers through cavities and channels in the rock face, causing a rhythmic collision between the momentum of the onrushing water and the backlash of the waves against the rocks. From a solid, dull green mass of sea water, a spray of bright shining droplets, coruscating in the light of the setting sun, was thrown up, each as lovely as the next, the parts as lovely as the whole. The Bible mentions the quiet chambers of the mind, the place within ourselves where we can retire from the stresses and strains of our daily life and polish our memories. My memory of an evening watching the sad sea waves in Portpatrick has been looked at many times in the past. Of its own volition, it sprang to mind when I thought to write this.

Imagine almost 250 people, as usual a fairly solid dull mass, and even Scottish country dancers en masse can be described in this way, perhaps under the influence of the moon in her courses, but certainly under the influence of Miss Milligan—can one describe the staff at the Summer School, both teachers and pianists, as cavities and channels in a rock?—possibly in this context it is fair since under Miss Milligan's influence, the staff broke up this dull mass into the personalities of the fortnight. But, what gives the light that makes the spray coruscate—that makes each droplet sparkle—that makes each and every course member give of him or her self? The sun, of course, in the purely physical sense. And the sun that makes our St. Andrews personalities sparkle?—fellow feeling, esprit de corps, the spirit of Scottish Country Dancing. Whatever it might be called, it allows 250 people to live together for 14 days, not just in harmony, but in a particularly friendly, brotherly way. It allows people to dance 'Hooper's Jig' at one of the Younger Hall dances, with six lines of dancers on the floor, with nothing but enjoyment and good humour—and at the end of that most crowded jig, it makes them ask for and receive an encore. Whatever it is, it is the essence of St. Andrews Summer Schools and of the Society.

This spirit was particularly noticeable in the reaction to the raffles. As is well known, the proposed celebrations for the Society's 50th birthday include a Ball to be held in Glasgow. In order to keep costs to the members within reasonable bounds, donations are being accepted by Miss Milligan for her Mile of Pennies. Additionally, during the Summer School, raffles were drawn for the same purpose. During the first week £14 was raised when two bottles of champagne were raffled. The following week's raffle realised £22. In the first week of the second fortnight £26 was made, and in the last week a magnificent £50 was raised. The generosity of the donors of the prizes, ranging from a 5 yard length of tweed, to a voucher for £2.50 from James Senior's shoe shop, by way of several bottles and boxes, was only equalled by the free spending of the buyers of tickets, and by the assiduity and obvious success of the ticket sellers.

Within the Summer School, the Ceilidhean are a focal point, and this year, as ever, a most enjoyable method of letting one's hair down and of poking a little gentle fun at authority. The focal point for anyone outside the Society must be, as far as St. Andrews is concerned, the members of the Society at the Summer School. It was a delight to hear Provost Niven of the Royal Burgh of St. Andrews praise the members of the Summer School for the added interest they bring to the town during the term of the School. It was also delightful to see the letter of appreciation from the Secretary of the Atholl and Breadalbane Agricultural Society sent after members of the School had demonstrated at that organisation's Highland Games. This could well be an annual event and like the demonstrations at Pitlochry provides a window for the world to look at the work of the Society.

The American Indians delineated their calendar by the most memorable event occurring during each year. At St. Andrews, we have had the Year of the Belgians, the year Miss Milligan sang at the Ceilidh and, of course, next year will be the year of the 50th Birthday. What of this year—the Year of the Raffles or the Year of the most danceable New Book, or even the year Miss Grubb made a speech at a Younger Hall dance. Whatever it is called by each individual who attended, it is certain that the memory of a most enjoyable Summer School will be deposited in the quiet chambers of the mind and looked at with pleasure.

Bars 5–8, 1st couple, passing by left, dance round 1st corners with right shoulder.
- No. 11 *THE LADIES OF DUNSE*  
Bars 25–32, 3rd and 1st couples dance right and left across and back (Fig. 2).  
1st couple finish facing 1st corners.
